



Dear Teachers, Administrators and Students considering participation in Alaska Poetry Out Loud:

As we enter the new year of Poetry Out Loud, we hope you will join us! The Alaska Poetry Out Loud partnership team at the Juneau Arts & Humanities Council and the Alaska State Council on the Arts is pleased to open registration for Alaska Poetry Out Loud in the 2026-2027 school year! The Alaska Poetry Out Loud partnership will be featuring content about poetry and literary arts in Alaska, to help connect us together through a shared sense of place: follow us on Facebook at [Poetry Out Loud: Alaska](#). This guide is intended to provide teachers, administrators, librarians, community arts partners and other poetry supporters in our schools with the information needed to participate in Poetry Out Loud from the classroom, to your school and community, to the regional, state and national competitions.

Poetry Out Loud is a national arts education program that encourages the study of great poetry by offering free educational materials and a dynamic recitation competition for high school students across the country. Rather than being a simple exercise in memorization, learning to recite poetry encompasses college and career ready skills, including structural analysis, interpretation of meaning, point of view, close-reading and the use of higher order thinking skills.



Why Should I Participate in Poetry Out Loud as an Educator?

- Poetry Out Loud encourages students to develop a personal connection with both classic and contemporary poetry.
- The process moves students beyond surface-level comprehension, by asking them to analyze a poem deeply in order to understand and perform it effectively.
- It strengthens memorization skills—an increasingly uncommon skill in today's technology-driven world.
- Poetry Out Loud Connects the written word with performance arts and gives students the opportunity to perform and be recognized at the local, state regional, national levels.
- Alaska State Poetry Out Loud builds a sense of community among educators and students across the state of Alaska. Hosting local programs can enhance school culture and connectedness of students and educators through a shared endeavor.

Both public and private schools are [eligible to participate](#). Alaska students currently enrolled in grades 9-12 are eligible to participate in Alaska Poetry Out Loud, with an exception made for 8th-grade students participating in a 9-12th grade class.

At the school level of Alaska Poetry Out Loud (AK POL), each school including grades 9-12, public or private, coordinates its own competition. School winners participate in a region-wide competition, with regions to be determined in coordination with the AK POL Partnership Team, following the registration period. School Registrants for AK POL should hold a schoolwide competition, and work with regional competition organizers to submit between at least one, and no more than three student competitors to the regional competition, representing your school.

AK POL also offers Individual At-large Student Registration, when there is not an AK POL School Competition available. The AK POL Partnership Team will work with individual, at-large, student registrant to identify a local POL Liaison who can support them through the process, and we will also connect individually registering students with a local school, or AK POL Regional Competition, as available and appropriate.

In 2026-2027 Alaska Regional POL Competitions will include both in-person or video-adjudicated competitions, across the state. The AK POL Partnership is open to the option for schools to come together for in-person AK POL Regional competitions, when two or more schools are available to compete in your region. To host an in-person regional competition in 2026-2027, schools and at-large student registrants must:

- 1) Coordinate within the region to hold the competition according to the Poetry Out Loud Guidelines at <https://poetryoutloud.org/teachers-and-organizers/organize-a-competition/>.
- 2) Include participants from multiple schools within a geographically defined region.
- 3) Consult with the AK POL Partnership Team on the definition/designation of an in-person region; regional competition coordinators must report AK POL regional winners and runners-up to the AK POL partnership team no later than February 1, 2027.

A student may not advance to the state finals without competing in a lower-level competition. To compete directly in the regional level of competition as an individual at-large student competitor, please consider the following guidelines:

- 1) An at-large, individual student participant must identify an AK POL School teacher/liaison/coach, who has agreed to be a point of contact with the AK POL Partnership Team, and
- 2) If the student's school is registered for AK POL, the student must participate in the school competition. If more than three, at-large, individual student participants register from any school entity, the school must determine the students who will proceed forward to the regional level of competition.

We recognize that the experience of participation in video adjudication and in-person competitions is different for students across the state. To increase the parity of experience for students leading into the Alaska State Competition, **each student will be required to recite two poems from the Poetry Out Loud Anthology at the Alaska Regional Competitions—both in-person and via video adjudication.**

The Alaska State Finals Competition gathering will be held in-person, in Juneau, February 27 - March 2, 2027 and the Alaska State Council on the Arts will coordinate with AK POL State Finalists to book travel for the student finalist and a chaperone, to attend the AK POL State Competition.

The AK POL State Competition will be held on the evening of March 1. As required by the rules of the National Poetry Out Loud Recitation Competition, **each student will be required to recite three poems from the Poetry Out Loud Anthology at the Alaska State Poetry Out Loud Finals Competition, in accordance with the Poem Eligibility Rules.** Only versions of poems from the official Poetry Out Loud Online Anthology may be used in the competition. No other criteria for student poem selections apply to the 2027 program.

We are partnering with KTOO Public Media to ensure that people in the State Finalists' home communities and across the state have access to the live web stream of the State Competition.

Schools, and at-large individual students must register for Alaska Poetry Out Loud. The [online registration form](#) will ask questions about teachers participating in Poetry Out Loud at your school and will ask you to identify a POL Liaison to help facilitate communication with the Alaska Poetry Out Loud Partnership Team. If you are a community arts partner to a school or in a geographical region, please contact the AK POL Partnership Team about registration.

Should more than three students register at-large from a single school, where the school is not already registered, the AK POL partnership team will consult and coordinate with that school in mounting a school competition. Please note that in the case where a school does not have enough students to hold a classroom or school competition, AK POL's Regional level of competition will meet the program guidelines for eligibility.

More about Poetry Out Loud

Poetry Out Loud is an initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with state and jurisdictional arts agencies and managed by Mid Atlantic Arts. Juneau Arts and Humanities Council and KTOO Public Media are key partners in Alaska Poetry Out Loud. This program helps students master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and learn about literary history and contemporary life.

Since the program began in 2005, more than 4.5 million students across the U.S. have participated in Poetry Out Loud. Poetry Out Loud begins at the local level with a school or organization. Non-school organizations, such as after school clubs, libraries, or nonprofit organizations, may also choose to run Poetry Out Loud as well. Students may only compete in one stream—either with their school or with an organization.

Poetry Out Loud students must read closely to determine what the text says and are then asked to use the highest order thinking skills possible to develop what they know about the text into a unique performance that uses subtle gesture, posture and physical presence to embody the meaning of words. Poetry Out Loud supports learning for all students, as each one is able to approach it from his or her own level AND as the program aligns with the Alaska ELA standards.
